Walt Disney's Greatest Storyman

We often see an animated film and do not consider the work that went into it behind the scenes. Bill Peet is one of the primary storytellers behind many well-known animated movies and children's books.

Bill Peet's creative abilities developed at a young age. He grew up in the countryside and visited his grandfather's farm often, which gave him access to the wilderness. These experiences, along with trips to the zoo, laid the foundation for future drawings of animals.

When Peet went to school, his constant drawing was sometimes a problem, but his teacher continued to encourage it. He dreamed of a career where he could put his passion for drawing to good use. He earned a scholarship to an art school after high school and studied there for three years.

After art school, Peet needed to find a way to earn a living. He moved to California after he heard that Walt Disney was looking for artists. When he first started working for Walt Disney, Peet sketched and planned screen stories. Eventually, he became a primary storyman. Peet did the complete storyboards for two movies: *The Sword in the Stone* and *101 Dalmatians*. He also worked on *Peter Pan*, *Dumbo*, and *The Jungle Book*.

Peet's children's stories began as bedtime stories for his sons. He illustrated his stories with many animals and some people too. Peet used different types of media for his drawings. He drew in pastels, pencils, pen, and even oil paint. Many of the illustrations in his books are done in coloured pencil crayons and ink.

Two of Peet's animated movies won awards. He is more well-known though as "Walt Disney's Greatest Storyman."
